
Market Garden on Muskoka Road 117 - just 1.5 km east of the bridge.

Some other fun and rewarding events that I was involved with: The Baysville, Days Gone By displays that can be



Lake of Bays Fire Station 40 News

To kick off 2020, Station 40 again hosted our Epic New Years Eve party. Fun was had by everyone who attended, and the donations we received are helping to fund our new auto extrication stabilization struts. These struts are a welcomed tool allowing us to add an additional level of safety while working on disabled vehicles. Come and see our equipment at this year's Baysville Walkabout. Any of the

firefighters in attendance will be happy to explain the equipment and when it's used.

We also had some significant service milestones in 2019: Steve Peace and Fred Landry were recognized for 10 years of service; Kimberly Redwood and Ian MacKinnon were recognized for 15 years of service; David Tilly was recognized for 20 years of service, and District Chief Glen Maynard was recognized for 40 years of service!



In the District Chief's 40 years he's seen significant change to the department. 40 years ago, when a new firefighter came on board, there was no formal training. You learned the craft through on the job training. Now, we are formally trained and certified to the same standards as our career brothers and sisters. Back in the day, the

District Chief would receive a phone call, and then systematically call each of the members to respond to an incident. Today, technology allows all members to be simultaneously notified by pager. Once on-scene, the members would open a box on the truck and pull out some of the limited bunker gear. There wasn't enough for every member, so it was first come first serve. Those lucky enough to get a set of gear, such as it was, would



fight the fire without the safety of Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). Move forward 40 years, and each member has their own bunker gear, and Station 40 has 8 SCBA with plans for an additional 2 shortly.

We've come a long way from a single pumper responding to structure fires and, as we started performing rescues, a donated Bell Canada van acting as our first rescue truck. Today we have a

pumper, tanker and purpose built rescue truck responding to structure fires, bush/forest fires, car fires, medical emergencies, water rescue, rope rescue, motor vehicle collisions, not to mention cat's in trees. Glen has witnessed all of this, the transition from Lake of Bays Fire Department to the amalgamated Huntsville/Lake of Bays Fire Department and much more we generally don't share.

So, when you see Glen around town or at any of our events, take a moment and thank him for his dedicated service to our community.



Alex Moeller ~ Baysville's Last War Veteran

Always ready with a smile and joke, Alex, a fit 96, is also Baysville's last war veteran. He's enjoyed this community since a family holiday in 1933 at the King's guest house on King's Rd. His parents, Georgia and August, immediately sought property to purchase and found it on the river, where "the Ellis boys" had erected just six logs of a square cabin. In 1934, parents, six children, a dog, a canary, and their grandmother, piled into their Model T Ford and arrived to tent for the summer while completing the cabin. However, a polio epidemic in Toronto delayed their return, and

Alex, 11, and two siblings began their school year here.

Alex remembers walking along the shoreline from Baysville to King's Rd., munching wild raspberries, to visit the Kings and enjoy Mrs. King's ready supply of cookies.

Leaving school, he worked as a butcher for Dominion Stores but in 1941 decided to enlist. Still 17, too young to sign up here, Alex and a buddy hitchhiked to Quebec, where he could. His enlisted older brother, Bud, managed to "claim" him, bringing him home to serve with him in the Conn Smythe Brigade. Alex served for four years, landing in Normandy a few weeks after D-Day. On his



by Wendy Truscott return in 1945, he found work

where he could, learning valuable trades by working at De Havilland and Canada Rogers Sheet Metal.

In 1952, Alex met Rhoda, "the best thing that ever happened to me", at a dance and also introduced her to the cottage. They married in 1954, and in 1957, began construction of their own cottage on the property. After the birth of son Paul, in 1962, Rhoda began spending summers here with him, while Alex came up weekends.

Alex's maternal aunt, Lucy, married Ken McPhee. They eventually moved from Toronto to Echo Lake, and later to University

St., Baysville, where Alex's mother, Georgia, joined them.

Through years of self-study and exams, Alex became a Stationary Engineer at A&P's head office, where Rhoda also worked. In 1990, upon retirement, they immediately moved to Baysville. Here, Alex has enjoyed golf, boating, fishing, puttering, and maintaining their beautiful property. Grandchildren, Sean and Scarlett, are the fifth generation to enjoy it. Asked to describe the biggest change he's seen after 86 years in this area, Alex states it is the tremendous community spirit which infuses the life of this village.

Shirley Vanclieaf - A Lifetime of Love & Laughter by Judy Vanclieaf

Shirley Vanclieaf' describes her life as full of love, with a lot of great memories, here she shares some of her memories of her life and what it was like at times living in Baysville in "the good ole days"

Her life began in Britt Ontario, on April 4th, of 1934 to parents Dwight and Marie (Reil) Tonge. Shirley sadly doesn't remember her father as he went off to war when she was young and was one of many who

didn't make it home. An only child, she and her mother moved to Toronto in a time when it was much smaller, and one could get to know their neighbours. "I had a lot of friends living in Toronto," recalls Shirley, "We would go to the movies, which cost a quarter and you got popcorn. We would go roller skating in the streets, and in the winter, we ice skated on outdoor rinks. Those were really good times."

When Shirley was 13 years old, she and her mom came to Baysville for a holiday and stayed with Bunny and Daisy Dawson's, good friends of her mother. This vacation would be the first time she would meet Leonard Vanclieaf. But their paths wouldn't cross again for another few years.

In 1949, at the age of 15, she and her mom made the move to Baysville where Shirley would finally connect with Len. She vividly remembers her first date with Len. "We were at the Baysville ice rink and Len thought he was teaching me how to skate, I didn't let on, but I already knew how from years skating in Toronto". From that moment on they were inseparable, and they soon developed a common interest of square dancing. Every week they would head out to Huntsville to go square

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dancing in an old barn on Brunel Road. Shirley remembers the old barn was on a slant and the stairs were very unstable. At the time they never gave it a second thought, "I have no idea how we ever had the nerve to go in that old barn with the rickety old stairs. It was very unnerving." The square dances were there every week and they never missed one. "That place would be packed as people would have come from all round just to

dance and have fun. Sometimes we would venture to the Baysville square dances, but they usually ended up in a big fight,"

Shirley took a business law course and became a legal secretary where she worked for a lawyer in Bracebridge After a couple years, the lawyer closed his office and moved back to the States, it was then that she went to work for Bell Telephone in Huntsville and lived in an apartment across the street from the Theater.

Len was a very romantic man, but his proposal to Shirley was not your typical romantic moment, and yet she remembers every detail vividly leading up to the proposal. Her story goes like this:

"Len and I were on a bus that Kelly's Transport had going daily out to Huntsville; we were on our way to the movie theatre. Bill Kelly was driving that day, and the bus was right full of people from Baysville including Mrs. Bell and Lois Lawson. We were all yacking and laughing, when suddenly Bill yells out. "The wheel is coming off the bus, I'm opening the door, don't anyone go near it until I get the bus stopped.' Well Mrs. Bell panicked and



Lake of Bays Brewery ~ Celebrating 10 Years in Baysville







The Friends are an indomitable bunch and we are determined to continue our support of the Baysville Branch Library. We have promised the staff that our funding will not





The Winter Pantry in Baysville & Dorset

As I write this, Covid-19 is on everyone's mind. We hope that, as you read this, it is over. We will continue to service our clients and others in the community through this difficult time.

Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

Your generosity in 2019 was phenomenal and has enabled us to do so much!

We opened our food support program 14 Wednesdays from late October to the end of April. About 20 local "families" came to us for help during this time. Winter Pantry families run the gamut from single adults to married couples and people with children. And our families include all ages. Thanks to the generosity of our local community, we were able to offer these families perishable items such as meat, milk, eggs, cheese, potatoes, carrots, and apples in addition to a wonderful selection of non-perishable items.

Can you imagine for a moment shopping for those perishable items every 2 weeks from October to April? Schlepping around the grocery stores with multiple carts, packing the bags and bags of groceries into your car, then lugging them into St. Ambrose Anglican Church and putting them all away? This year we were very pleased to be able to ease this immense burden on our volunteers by hiring a part-time employee to do our shopping and to sort food donations.

December was a very busy and exciting month for us. With the support of The Bay Food Crew and other donors, we distributed 30 Christmas dinners to our clients and others in the community. The Baysville Lions provided us with gift cards for our clients with children as well as gifts for our single clients.


Folks became quite concerned that someone would come around a bend and find Murray standing on the road so additional signs were added to 117 to make drivers aware of his presence.



jumped up in attempt to get off the bus. Len had to grab her and pull her back. The bus, with us all on it, went down that hill sideways. I don't know how he did it, but Bill finally got the bus stopped and everyone got out. Bill, who had been so calm and cool while we were on our spinout, just stood there and shook. I'm sure, if anyone else had of been driving, we wouldn't have made it! Somehow, someone got a hold of Mr. Kelly in Baysville, and another vehicle was sent out to bring everyone home." (You can find this story told from Bill Kelly's perspective in his book called "A Decade of Wheels.) "It was the next day when Len said to me "I think we better get married Shirley; I can't imagine ever not having you in my life." She smiles.

A few months later, in December 1953, they were married in Huntsville. "It was a beautiful bright sunny day, and everything sparkled, which is what happens when it is -40! After the wedding, we came back to Baysville for the reception at the Town Hall, which was right beside the Lincoln Lodge on Bridge Street (now a vacant lot). Some of the locals gathered to play for our





reception. There was Edith Heney who played the violin, a couple of the Hammond boys played guitars, (the whole Hammond family were quite musical). Someone else played the piano and Scotty Campbell, the postmaster did the calling for the Square Dance and they did it all for free. Baysville was right full of wonderful people, I'll never forget them!" In 1954 Shirley and Len welcomed the birth of their son Garth who brought great joy to the Vanclieaf family.

Shirley began to work for Muskoka Weavers, owned by Beatrice and John Purens. There was a large loom upstairs in their home on Spruce Street, just north of the town docks on the eastern side of the river im Baysville. "I used to make the material, then others in the community would have looms set up in their homes where they would weave the handbags and placemats." Recalls Shirley. "They were quite the rage at that time and the Purens would ship all over the world." After a while, Shirley too, had a loom in her home on University Street. (formerly Len's grandparents, Maggie and Jack Vanclieaf.) Her employment with the Purens led them to a friendship that lasted a lifetime.

When curling came to Baysville in the mid 1950's Shirley and Len became avid curlers, despite the somewhat rustic conditions of the original rink. Shirley recalls, "The ceiling in the curling rink was so low that you could take your broom and touch it. There was a little room when you first came in the door and if you wanted to go downstairs you had to duck your head. It was like going into a dugout room where there were benches, a toilet, and a bar and everyone would be smoking. not sure if the bar was even legal" she laughs. "The roof always leaked and there was usually too much water on the ice, or it was too mild, which made the curling surface too soft." Because of this, the ladies of the club decided to fundraise and purchased shingles for the leaking roof. When the shingles came, the men were asked to put them on. Summer came and went, and it still had not been done, so when fall rolled around, the women decided enough was enough. "We all gathered at the rink with ladders, hammers and nails and got up on the roof. Aubrey Hammond happened to come along and saw them up there and yelled at them. "You women get off that roof." The next day there were 10 men putting shingles on the roof. Now that's how you get things done!

Shirley and Len took to curling in Huntsville where they would have completed 60 years of rock throwing. Sadly, Shirley had to give up her favourite sport due to knee issues; but just because her knees wouldn't let her curl,

she would often travel to Huntsville see her friends play. Shirley still continues to enjoy watching it on television.

In 1967 the family moved up to Glenmount where Len and his cousin Jeff Robertson partnered together in the purchase of an old boat house at the bottom of the hill on the Lake of Bays. They dismantled the old building and rebuilt it as Glenmount Marina. "The place was a going concern." recalls Shirley. "We offered gasoline, bread, milk, meat, everything the tourist would need for the weekend. It was a busy little place and very popular with the teens. We would also stay open until midnight. They certainly were fun times."

Just down the road, the Lake of Bays Sailing club would hold regattas every summer where the family would all participate. Len and Shirley would enter the mixed doubles canoe races, Len and Garth would enter every race they could and often would win every race they entered. 'We have so many trophies packed away" says Shirley, "Garth took after his father as he was crafty in a canoe and would compete in the doubles and single canoe races as well." And now, David their grandson follows in his grandfather and fathers' footsteps in crafting a canoe over the waters of Lake of Bays.

There was always music and laughter around the Vanclieaf home. "The doors were always open to friends", says Shirley. "We would often have jam sessions where Len would play the guitar and we would all dance. Oh! those were the good ole days!", sighs Shirley.

When Len passed away of Alzheimer's in April of 2017, they would have been married for 63 years. She misses him ever single day, but most of all she misses his daily hugs. "I got my hug every morning, I would be out making breakfast and it wouldn't be long when would come out and put his arms around me and tell me that he loved me."


Shirley now spends her days with her watch dog, Swiffer, often nestled together on the couch watching curling. Her

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grandsons David and Daniel always bring a smile to her heart every time they come to visit or call to chat. "I am looking forward to seeing my munchkin's again really soon." Going back and sharing all her memories makes Shirley feel nostalgic.

"I am so glad I moved here from Toronto, it's a special place and I can't ever imagine not being in Baysville."

Baysville Riverfront Group & Arts & Craft Festival



The Baysville Riverfront Group will once again host the 34th Arts & Crafts Festival in Baysville, Ontario Saturday August 8, 2020 from 9 am.to 4 pm. and Sunday August 9, 2020 from 10 am to 4 pm. It is a two day outdoor event featuring unique and original artisans from all over Ontario

In 1987 Richard (Dick) Robinson and his wife, Marlene, organized the first show with eight vendors participating. It was held in Grist Mill Park behind Maggie's Restaurant, where Fork In the Road and Humble Pie Bakery are now located. In 1989 the decision was made to relocate the show to Centennial Park as the number of vendors had increased to 34.

In 2001 the Riverfront Group began organizing the festival as a major fund raising event with the proceeds being used to support the community of Baysville. After a major bridge construction occurred, the Festival moved to the park by the library for a few years, however feedback from the exhibitors indicated that they wanted a more visible location and a setting that was aesthetically pleasing. In the fall of 2012 the Riverfront Group made the decision to hold the 2013 festival in Gristmill Park and the adjacent Robertson Parkette.

The park-like setting is adjacent to the Muskoka River and contains multiple flower gardens and trees. The two parks are separated by a band shell and public washrooms. There are docks that allow boaters direct access into the park.

In 2013 the festival was made up of over 70 artisans, Admission to the festival is by donation with the proceeds going to the Baysville Horticultural Society. The Baysville Lions Club also uses this event as a fund raiser by selling beverages and food in the bandshell.

The Baysville Riverfront Group will continue to support the maintenance of the infrastructure along the Riverfront, including walkways, gardens, docks, lighting and seating. In addition, donations are directed to support



This year is the 35th anniversary of the founding of the Lake of Bays Heritage Foundation. It all began with Dr. Royal Montgomery of Montgomery Point, suggesting to George Daniels, then Vice-President of the Lake of Bays Association (LOBA), that he would like to



have a vehicle through which he and others could leave money to protect the environment so valued by the lake community. This message was conveyed to Robin Cumine, a lawyer and then-President of LOBA, who suggested, and then worked to establish, a land and cultural conservancy as a legal entity with charitable status. A planning group, chaired by George and consulting with LOBA members, gave shape to the initial program. On October 1, 1985 the Foundation became a legal reality and by July 1986, a charity. The founding directors were Bill Daniel (President), Edwin Brezina, Robin Cumine, Jack Hanna, Douglas McTaggart, Simon Miles, and Chris Yaneff of the planning group as well as Henry Adamson, Roy Montgomery, William Patterson, Richard Roberts and Marion White.

Over the intervening 35 years, we have focused on engaging the community to protect the character and

charm of the Lake of Bays region our environment, cultural history and heritage buildings. We provide the community with a number of conservation, stewardship and educational programs aimed at learning about and protecting our heritage.

Each year, we delve into the history

of a different community around our diverse lake and last year we chose Montgomery Point. Starting in 1897, Dr. Andrew Montgomery and family came each summer from Brantford, staying first at Port Cunnington Lodge and then Fox Point Inn. In 1919, Dr. Montgomery bought 113 acres on the south-west point of the Port Cunnington peninsula. Successive generations have occupied the point for 100 years keeping family traditions alive. Lots were subsequently sold to the Kirby, Daniels and Turner families who have also been lifelong residents. A Foundation video and booklet portray life at Montgomery Point over the past 100 years, illustrating the hardiness of the families arriving by train and steam boat with no running water or electricity, and many activities available to them at Bigwin Inn and the Golden Slipper Hall at Port Cunnington.



We welcomed back Craig Douglas, a comic unicycle riding juggler who provided entertainment for a perfect end to a wonderful Family Day.


Once again, thanks so much to the many volunteers, businesses and volunteer groups who made this day a fun one for all.


November and February found some of our members volunteering alongside our

as sports, fitness work-outs, and day-to-day functioning.




