

Laughter in the Cemetery

It's not often you'll hear laughter in a cemetery, but one day last September, there was plenty. The story behind it began in Baysville, on Saturday, May 18, 1956, the day my life changed forever.

The previous evening, I was a starry-eyed Grade 9 student attending my first high school formal dance, with a handsome boy named Carl. Saturday morning, as my family drove to our cottage, my head still danced with sweet memories. Arriving in Baysville, we dropped in on friends before heading to our place.

For years, Helen and Art Barlow, and their sons, Ray and Bob, had made their cottage on Heney Lake Rd., below the dam, a hub for happy times, much laughter, hilarious pranks, crazy exploits, and great cooking.

As usual, the Barlows had guests - two brothers, one of whom was studying for his Grade 13 finals. We discovered he and I attended the same Toronto high school. That afternoon, the Barlow boys and the Truscott boys, Barry and Paul, arrived at our cottage to fish. I climbed into the boat Bob was rowing, and while he and Paul fished, we chatted.

That evening, (on Paul's behalf) the boys invited me to the always rousing Baysville square dance, which my father by Wendy Truscott

refused, but by the time the weekend was over, I was no longer thinking of Carl, my Friday night date. Years later, at our wedding, Paul and I thanked Bob Barlow for rowing that day, allowing us to become acquainted.

Fast-forward to September, 2018: Bob and his wife, Ethna, who'd sold their cottage, visited ours. They remain fond of Baysville and mentioned their desire to be buried here but stated they weren't sure how to make arrangements. Since the two of us had the same idea, we decided to phone Cathy Vanclieaf for information.

The next day, as we all stood in the cemetery, looking across the river to where Paul and I met and the Barlows hosted so many great times, we felt we'd come full circle and how appropriate it was the four of us will be side by side. You might not think choosing burial plots could be fun, but we had plenty of chuckles, and as we regaled Cathy with stories of some of our antics across the river, she commented, "Well, when you're here, I'd just ask you to keep it down at night."


We left the cemetery laughing, happy in the knowledge our beloved Baysville would be the final stop on this amazing journey we've shared.

Baysville's Own Shirley Prittie

Shirley Prittie remembers the day she told her dad that she wouldn't be caught dead in Baysville. Little did she know that she would end up spending a good part of her adult life here.

Shirley was born in Sprucedale in 1934 to parents Preston Gerhart and Louella May Bielby. She is the fourth of six children, Bill, Bernice, Marie, Shirley, Betty and Jim. Her family eventually

relocated to Huntsville to the property where Arrowhead Park now sits.

As a student at Huntsville High School (HHS), Shirley won a competition where the students in her class were to come up with a name for the annual fall colour observance in Muskoka. It was 1952 and her teacher Doug Stone, who also was a member of the Chamber of Commerce in Huntsville, brought forward the challenge to the class. "I had visions of all the colours in Algonquin Park marching one behind the other and so I called it Cavalcade of Colour. I won \$5 for that," said Shirley.

Shirley was also Mayor of Huntsville when she was a teen. An all Ontario organization called *Teen Town* was being run through the schools. The group had to form their own council, plan events and run it like it was a town. "One day *Teen Town* took over the Town Hall in Huntsville. I was Mayor for a whole week", she laughs. Shirley spent that week sitting in on council meetings, and shadowing Mayor Rice She got the chance to see what it was really like to be Mayor.

After high school, Shirley was off to Sick Kids Hospital to become a nurse. This is around the time frame when she met Bob, her husband now of 62 years. "I met Bob in

Toronto on a blind date while I was in training at Sick Kids. One night one of my classmates came to me and said, "Shirley, you are going out tonight on a blind date with us, We've got five men coming up from downtown, we are going dancing and we need you." "When we met up with the men, everyone paired up. Bob came up to me and said, 'I guess I'm stuck with you.'

she grins. The date was a success as they went out again the following night.

Shirley trained for three years at sick kids and graduated as a nurse in 1957, where she continued to work.

Living a charmed life in Toronto with their four children Bill, John, Tom and Ted, one day in 1979, Bob came home and told Shirley that he had bought them a cottage on Lake of Bays. "When we went to see the place, it was in such derelict state, I said to Bob, You have lost your mind!" She laughs. "And that's how I ended up on Lake of Bays". Prior to this, I had no interested in moving up to Muskoka, my only plans were to come visit my mom in Huntsville".

Bob was a visionary, he could look at something and see great potential. "He knew how to make things happen" say's Shirley. "Like one day in 1984, we came to buy a bottle of rum at the Liquor Store in Baysville, back when it was a trailer. Bob saw a For Sale sign on the building across the street and said, "I'm going over to see what they want for that house".





The Winter Pantry in Baysville & Dorset



Baysville Riverfront Group & Arts & Craft Festival



The Baysville Riverfront Group will host the 32nd Arts & Crafts Festival in Baysville, Ontario on Saturday August 10 from 9 am. to 4 pm. and on Sunday August 11, 2019 from 10 am to 4 pm. It is a two day outdoor event featuring unique and original artisans from all over Ontario.

In 1987 Richard (Dick) Robinson and his wife, Marlene, organized the first show with eight vendors participating. It was held in Grist Mill Park behind Maggie's Restaurant, where Fork In the Road and Humble Pie Bakery are now located. It remained at this locale for one year and then moved to the arena due to inclement weather. In 1989 the decision was made to relocate the show to Centennial Park as the number of vendors had increased to 34.

In 2001 the Riverfront Group began organizing the festival as a major fund raising event with the proceeds being used to support the community of Baysville. After a major bridge construction occurred, the Festival moved to the park by the library for a few years, however feedback from the exhibitors indicated that they wanted a more visible location and a setting that was aesthetically pleasing. In the fall of 2012 the Riverfront Group made the decision to hold the 2013 festival in Gristmill Park and the adjacent Robertson Parkette.

The park-like setting is adjacent to the Muskoka River and contains multiple flower gardens and trees. The two parks are separated by a band shell and public washrooms. There are docks that allow boaters direct access into the park.

In 2013 the festival was made up of over 70 artisans, all of whom displayed handcrafted items "Made in Canada".


Admission to the festival is by donation with the proceeds going to the Baysville Horticultural Society. The Baysville Lions Club also uses this event as a fund raiser by selling beverages and food in the bandshell.

It was a season to remember – with Mother Nature providing the cold and the snow we count on. Many would say the best season we've seen in a very long time.

Trail preparations started as early as November and the Happy Wanderers trails were still open until March 28th. One of our longest seasons in many years.

One of the highlights of our season

was the installation of a bridge that re-opened a favourite loop after three years of work on permits, funding and construction. Just one example of what goes on behind the scenes when the snow is gone and winter is a distant memory to most.

All snowmobile clubs are made up of volunteers that work tirelessly on preparing for the season by removing fallen trees, cutting back brush, repairing bridges, putting in culverts or new bridges. Once the snow starts to fall—the trails need to be packed. This is the time when club members and riders cross their fingers and wish for freezing temperatures and then some good snowfalls. Without that—the opening sequence cannot begin and riders are restricted to polishing their sleds in their garage.

This past season, Baysville experienced over 1,000 riders every weekend and continued high volumes of visitors through the week, supporting the local economy. We're grateful to the townspeople and the businesses of Baysville for making everyone feel so welcome.

The season is over – but not the work. Now we begin collecting signs, removing culverts, service and store machinery and clean up where necessary – leaving no footprint behind. We take a brief pause and then begin

"We had no idea what we were doing when we opened the Manse Art Gallery" she laughs. "I had taken a few painting lessons before I came to Baysville, and even then, I only painted on porcelain". Her friend Carol had never touched a paint brush in her life. Two years later the Prittie's bought the old Catholic church and turned it into a studio where Shirley held art classes for the next 16 years.

In 1990, the couple purchased Janet Peake's house, another century old home which was built in 1890, The house where they would eventually retire in.

It wasn't long after that, Jim Ellis asked them if they would like to purchase the property across the street. "We inherited the old liquor store trailer!" she giggles. "We didn't quite know what we were going to do with the property, we bought it to protect our investment around us." This property has been turned into a beautiful park that is lit up every Christmas, making Baysville even more postcard perfect.

Then when Jack Maynard went into Sunnybrook, they were given first right of refusal, and purchased his property as well. Shirley proudly smiles as she looks out her window. "I own a little bit of heaven right here in Baysville".





The Lake of Bays Heritage Foundation

The Lake of Bays Heritage Foundation (LBHF) engages the community to protect the charm of the Lake of Bays region... our environment, our cultural history and our heritage buildings. We provide the community with a number of conservation, stewardship and educational programmes each aimed at learning about and protecting our heritage.

The history of Kerrimuir Road was researched this year from indigenous times to the Scottish settler, Duncan Brown,to the cottagers who

arrived throughout the 1900's. This history is documented in video and printed format and was presented at our Annual General Meeting in Baysville in August. Historic plaques were received by a number of families in recognition of their maintaining heritage cottages. Many members participated in a cottage tour following the meeting. During the nature component of our meeting, we learned that all Ontario turtles are now considered 'species at risk' due to the disappearing wetlands and increased road traffic. Jonathan Hathaway, owner of Scales Nature Park was our guest speaker. He is a leader in the START initiative 'Save The At Risk Turtles. It was an energetic presentation featuring live turtles from the smallest Spotted Turtle to the ferocious-looking Snapping Turtle.



This year many visitors came to explore our permanently protected property at Marsh's Falls with 6 kilometres of shoreline on the Lower Oxtongue River and 170 acres of mostly forested land. It is one of the most important natural habitat areas in the Township, and is recognized as a Muskoka Heritage Area. The Oxtongue River, the main headwaters of Lake of Bays, originates in Algonquin Park and the land surrounding the river provides a corridor for many migratory

species of which nine have been identified as 'at risk'. Public nature walks are held here led by qualified naturalists.

The popular Silent Boat Rally was held at the beginning of August starting at Marsh's Falls with an 8 kilometre paddle to the Lake and back with side trips into the many oxbows. The Irwin Memorial School in Dwight is delighted to have this property in their backyard with young students enjoying a number nature day trips. Other groups such as Probus and the Huntsville Naturalists visited for nature walks or a paddle on the river.

LBHF and the Township Heritage Advisory Committee jointly published a Paddle Guide to the Oxtongue, a great resource for paddlers containing a wealth of information on the history, geology, and the location of many species. Submitted by Judith Mills, President LBHF



Pharmasave Dorset Village Pharmacy isn't the first pharmacy in



SS Bigwin - A Historical Experience on Lake of Bays

The history of the SS Bigwin is a storied one. In 1910, James Kuhn (an industrialist from Pittsburgh, PA) launched a steamship on Lake Muskoka which he named after

his wife Ella Marie. They spent their summers on Belle Isle just north of Beaumaris on Lake Muskoka. Due to financial difficulty, the Ella Marie was sold some 15 years later and relocated to Lake of Bays where it was renamed the SS Bigwin.

For the next 45 years it served as the ferry boat for vacationers and golfers to the famous Bigwin Island Resort – carrying guests such as Clark Gable, Louis Armstrong, Winston Churchill, Greta Garbo out to the luxurious resort.

With the decline of the resort half a century ago, the SS Bigwin fell into disrepair and sat partially submerged on the bottom of her slip at Bigwin Inn. A coalition of Lake of Bays cottagers, residents and organizations conducted a massive fundraising and restoration project to return this precious part of lost heritage for residents and visitors to Lake of Bays and in 1991, the SS Bigwin was purchased and floated to dry dock in South Portage.

The ship launched officially to the public in July 2013, and is available to be enjoyed by everyone today and future generations tomorrow. 2014 was the first full season of public and private cruises aboard the restored SS Bigwin.

Beginning on May 17, 2019, the SS Bigwin will be cruising from Dorset twice a day on Friday, Saturday and Sunday until the end of June, from 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. and from 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

In July and August, you can set sail out of Dorset on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Also in July and August, on Thursdays there is a Cruise and Dine to Port Cunnington Lodge that departs from Dorset at 4:00 p.m..and arrives just before 5:30 p.m.. While those passengers are having their meal, there is a second cruise from the Lodge that departs at 5:30 p.m.

Cruises out of Dwight June 24th to August 27th will be on Monday from 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m and on Tuesday from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

On Tuesdays, to coincide with the Farmers Market we offer 3 cruises: 10:00 am to 11:00 am, 11:30 am to 12:30 p.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m.
